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## 9th Annual Black Women's Roundtable/ESSENCE "Power of the Sister Vote" Poll

Key findings from a survey conducted among Black women registered vołers in February 2024

## Methodology

Presentation also includes comparative dat a from a 2022 phone interview poll conducted by Brilliant Corners among 601 Black women registered voters between February 27-March 6, 2022.

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1 Economic anxieties are top of mind for Black women voters in 2024 with a particular focus on cost of living.

There is a clear generational gap within the Black women electorate: older Black women voters are locked in and motivated to vote while younger Black women voters are weighing their options.

While a slim majority of Black women voters (51\%) support president Biden's re-election, $20 \%$ remain undecided about who to support in the upcoming presidential election.

Part of this generational gap comes from younger Black women voters feeling increasingly anxious about the upcoming elections and they don't see that their lives have gotten better in the last four years.

Biden has a clear lead in the 2024 presidential vote, but his greatest threats are potential Independent/Third Party voters and drop off voters, especially among young Black women.

Silent Gen/Boomer Black women are much more likely to strongly approve of the job Biden is doing than younger generations.

Majorities of Black women across generations are dissatisfied with the direction of the country, up 18-points since 2022. Dissatisfaction is driven by economic concerns around cost of living.

Majority of Black women voters say they do not experience racism and/or sexism in their daily lives (younger Black women voters are more likely to report these experiences.)

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Black women voters think the Democratic Party is much better than the Republican Party on a host of issues, especially when it comes to protecting their rights, freedoms, and equality.

Feelings towards President Biden have gotten colder since 2022. Trump remains a disliked figure by most Black women voters.

Most Black women voters are motivated and plan to vote this election cycle, particularly older Black women voters and college-educated Black women voters.

Only a third of Black women voters say Biden has kept most or all of his 2020 campaign promises. Forty-six percent of Black women voters say their lives were better under Biden, $33 \%$ about the same, $22 \%$ better under Trump.

However, there are complicated feelings heading into the 2024 elections with a mix of hope and anxiety.

Biden has a clear lead in the 2024 presidential vote, but his greatest threats are potential Independent/Third Party voters and drop off voters, especially among young Black women.


Biden has work to do to consolidate the Black women voters who made up his 2020 base into his 2024 base. Per CNN exit polls, $90 \%$ of Black women voted for Biden in the 2020 presidential election.

A generic Democrat on a congressional ballot runs a few points ahead of Biden among Black women voters, with the base of support for Democrats continuing to come from older Black women.

In March 2022, 65\% of Black women voters said they already planned to vote for the Democratic congressional candidate.
