9th Annual Black Women's Roundtable/ESSENCE "Power of the Sister Vote" Poll

Key findings from a survey conducted among Black women registered voters in February 2024

Methodology

Survey Universe	Methodology	Overall Margin of Error	Survey field dates
800 Black women registered voters nationwide	Survey was conducted through a self-opt in online panel. Data was weighted to ensure that the sample was representative of the population demographics.	±3.77 (higher for subgroups and split-sampled questions)	February 16-21, 2024

Economic anxieties are top of mind for Black women voters in 2024 with a particular focus on cost of living.

There is a clear generational gap within the Black women electorate: older Black women voters are locked in and motivated to vote while younger Black women voters are weighing their options.

While a slim majority of Black women voters (51%) support president Biden's re-election, 20% remain undecided about who to support in the upcoming presidential election.

Part of this generational gap comes from younger Black women voters feeling increasingly anxious about the upcoming elections and they don't see that their lives have gotten better in the last four years.




Baseline Attitudes

Silent Gen/Boomer Black women are much more likely to strongly approve of the job Biden is doing than younger generations.






Majorities of Black women across generations are dissatisfied with the direction of the country, up 18-points since 2022. Dissatisfaction is driven by economic concerns around cost of living.




Most Black women voters report worsening economic conditions, including their wages falling behind the cost of living.



But when we boil it down, Black women voters think that the 2024 elections should be most about tackling inflation, improving the economy, and reducing gun violence.







Black women voters think the Democratic Party is much better than the Republican Party on a host of issues, especially when it comes to protecting their rights, freedoms, and equality.





2024 Elections


Feelings towards President Biden have gotten colder since 2022. Trump remains a disliked figure by most Black women voters.



Only a third of Black women voters say Biden has kept most or all of his 2020 campaign promises. Forty-six percent of Black women voters say their lives were better under Biden, 33% about the same, 22% better under Trump.




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
However, there are complicated feelings heading into the 2024 elections with a mix of hope and anxiety.

35. Which of the following emotions best describes how you are feeling when it comes to the upcoming 2024 elections? Select up to two.




